Local Food Bank Serves Those in Need with Canned Foods, Personal Hygiene Items and Lots of Love from the Community



There are co-ops. And then, there is the North Gwinnett Co-Op. More than a food pantry, the local private nonprofit serving Buford, Sugar Hill and Suwanee also pays utility bills, runs a thrift shop, offers tutoring and tends to seniors in need.

A step inside their operation will leave you awe-inspired by all they have to offer. The Co-Op recently more than doubled their space from 6,000 to 14,000 square feet. With three

separate bells for different doors – food delivery, thrift shop delivery and customer pickup – everything here is well thought out for the utmost efficiency. Donated clothes and décor are curated carefully before being placed on the sales floor of "Second Blessings." The thrift shop is merchandised so beautifully by seven-year volunteer and newly appointed employee, Vernet Farmer, you might feel like you're shopping at a brand name discount store. (But you're not and the prices are even better, too.)

Always looking for ways to streamline operations, a perpendicular aisle was recently added between long rows of shelving. Thanks to

eight football players from Lanier High School who lifted and moved the tall and heavy metal structures, it's now much easier for the food bank's volunteers to shop in the warehouse for their client's Ragu Pasta Sauce and Honey Nut Cheerios.

Thanks to a partnership with three local Publix Super Markets, freshly baked bread, pastries, peanut butter, and jelly are distributed daily. Macy's dropped off 1,700 formal gowns and Easter dresses to be sold in "Second Blessings". Proceeds from their sale at \$30 each will go to pay utility bills for people in need.

Generous corporate gifts aside, many of the donations made to the North Gwinnett Co-Op don't come from large grocery or department store chains at all. Rather, it's individuals and groups that host themed food drives such as "Taco'bout" and "Pajama Party" to collect taco kits and boxed cereals respectively. The food pantry has found great success in encouraging local businesses, schools, churches, and community organizations to take pride in making a difference in our communities.

With seven full-time staff members and 120 volunteers working in shifts of 20-30 people at a time, the North Gwinnett Co-Op is a well-oiled machine that serves those in need with dignity. Gwinnett County Fireplace Safety



There's nothing quite like lighting your fireplace on a chilly winter day. Gather the family to bask in the warmth and glow of the fire and stay safe this winter with these building safety tips:

- Use dry and well-aged wood. Wet or green wood causes more smoke and contributes to soot buildup in the chimney. Dried wood burns with less smoke and burns more evenly.
- Even if the chimney is not due for cleaning, it is important to check for animal nests or other blockages that could prevent smoke from escaping.
- For direct-vent fireplaces, make sure the damper stays open when the fireplace is running. The open damper will allow all the carbon monoxide to escape out of the chimney, but a closed damper will force the carbon monoxide into your home which is dangerous.
- Clean out ashes from previous fires. Levels of ash at the base of the fireplace should be kept to one inch or less because a thicker layer restricts the air supply to logs, resulting in more smoke.

- 1. The Bowl at Sugar Hill won the Best Public Improvement Project award! This space has created a true center of the community in Downtown Sugar Hill. The Bowl is home to sold-out rock and roll shows like Pat Benatar & Neil Giraldo, as well as intimate, backyard-like concerts where performers can play acoustically. With nine Sugar Hill Live On Stage concerts in 2021, The Bowl even welcomed a taste of New Orleans with Preservation Hall Jazz Band and Tank & The Bangas with special guest Sweet Crude. The city is proud of what The Bowl represents for cities across Georgia and hopes to continue bringing in a variety of acts and performances for community-wide entertainment for its upcoming 8th concert season.
- 2. The Eagle Theatre with its art deco style featuring geometric shapes, rich colors, and gold accents, pays homage to the early days of Sugar Hill. Today, the theatre is home to the Players Guild, the theatre's in-house performance troupe, drawing in some of the best talent around Sugar Hill. Whether you've attended a Players Guild show, one of over 25 \$2 Tuesdays or if you're planning to attend John Berry's Silver Anniversary Tour, the Eagle Theatre will leave you staring in awe.
- 3. Sugar Hill is in the Hall of Fame, the Georgia Municipal Association's Hall of Fame that is! Mayor Steve Edwards was one of five city leaders inducted into the Hall of Fame at GMA's Annual Convention in Savannah. One key to Sugar Hill's success is the high value the city places on quality of life. This commitment to quality of

life is exemplified in the city's initiative to develop a 16.5-mile Sugar Greenway. The end of this year marks five completed miles of the trail! During his terms, 2014 - 2021, Edwards and other officials turned Sugar Hill into a walkable community with retail, restaurants, and entertainment. He proudly embraces the Sugar Hill motto of "Go Big or Go Home."

4. Sugar Hill is a thriving city where communities enjoy the sweet life, full of local treasures like the city's community groups, with at least 12 groups to choose from. The volunteers that make up these groups are pivotal in a successful quality of place. These groups include:
